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FIRE CLAIMS BRYAN ADMIN. BUILDING

The End of One Era Brings Sadness at Loss, but Hope in the Phoenix of a New Day

A small fire broke out in Bryan College's Administration building around 6 p.m. on Sunday evening, Feb. 6, before growing to a raging blaze which destroyed the entire third floor, including classrooms, professors' offices, and the library labs. No one was injured by the unexpected inferno.

Freshman Tammy Smith was the first to raise the alarm. From her Honors dormitory room, she, along with fellow freshmen Sharyn Rose and Allison Johnson, spotted smoke billowing from windows in the Administration building. At 6:05 p.m. Smith called 911 and alerted Richard Mr. Helmer ran up the northernmost stairwell armed with a fire extinguisher. The door at the top of the stairs was closed, and Helmer could not open it because of the heat and smoke. Through the door's window he saw that flames had consumed the hole hallway. He then went to the central stairway. That door was open, and the hallway was "pitch black with smoke." Helmer yelled repeatedly for anyone inside to get out, and then shut the fire door. He then left the building and called 911 again before help arrived to rescue college files and computer servers.

As the fire trucks were arriving, Helmer and a group of Bryan faculty

members—Bryan President Bill Brown, Vice President Tom Kemmer, and Dean of Enrollment Tom Show—ran through the building to make sure that everyone was out. Luckily, the Administration Building was unoccupied. Most of the students were at supper, and the library had closed from 5 p.m. until 7 p.m., when the computer lab was scheduled to reopen.

While fire trucks arrived, a few Bryan faculty members ran through thickening smoke to save vital files and equipment. "The priority was getting the hard files of the applicants for the fall semester," said Show. Dr. Brown, Richard Helmer and I did a fireman's brigade and got the actual file drawers out of the office." Soon after that a larger group rescued the computer servers, which support Bryan's web site and intranet system and hold information for the school's administration, faculty, and students.

Later in the evening, fire crews also removed filing cabinets containing all academic transcripts, both historic and current, from the Registrar's office on the main floor.

Assistant Registrar Marc Nesbitt said, "My original request was just to shut the doors [of the fireproof cabinets], but the fire chief said that there's no such thing as a fireproof cabinet. So they brought in dollies [and removed the cabinets]. I was very impressed. They understood the importance of the material and moved it very quickly."

At 11 p.m., Captain Donno Moore of the City of Dayton Fire Department arrived with the first crew of firefighters. Moore went with his first crew up a stairwell, but the fire was unapproachable because of intense smoke and toxic gases. Moore reported that the smoke had reduced flashlight visibility to mere inches.

Moore said that after the initial frenzy inside the firemen went to a "defensive attack," or a strategy of containment the firemen would try to

keep the fire from spreading past the firewalls at the middle tower on the third floor, and also away from the Chemistry lab at the northern end of the building.

Firefighters managed to protect the lab, but not the rest of the third floor. At approximately 7:50 p.m., flames flared from roof sections south of the central tower, past the firewalls. Assistant Fire Chief of Dayton and Fire Investigator for Rhea County, Brian Kayler, related the battle.

"We had an interior attack, [but] the roof caved in and we had to pull them out because of the dangers involved. We couldn't stand any back in. So the fire rolled down the roof and jumped the firewalls to the south end of the building. The fire actually rolled over the top of the building on the outside and caught the other roof on fire."

A shortage of water also limited the firemen's effectiveness. According to Kayler, the college is well supplied by a six-inch water main, but this proved inadequate to the hoses' demands. The crews were forced to take turns, using a while crews in one section used the available water before they could act against the flames themselves.

With nothing more to stop its path, the fire advanced southward along the third floor. It consumed classroom after classroom and eventually devoured the top floor of the library at the building's southern end.

According to Moore, the fire was under control by 1:30 a.m. Monday morning, but firemen stayed the rest of the night to control hot spots and further secure the situation.

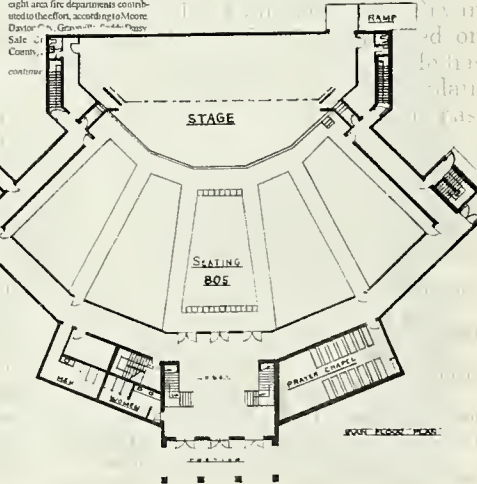
Approximately 100 men from eight area fire departments contributed to the effort, according to Moore. Director of Rhea County, Peggy Sale, County Commissioner, and County

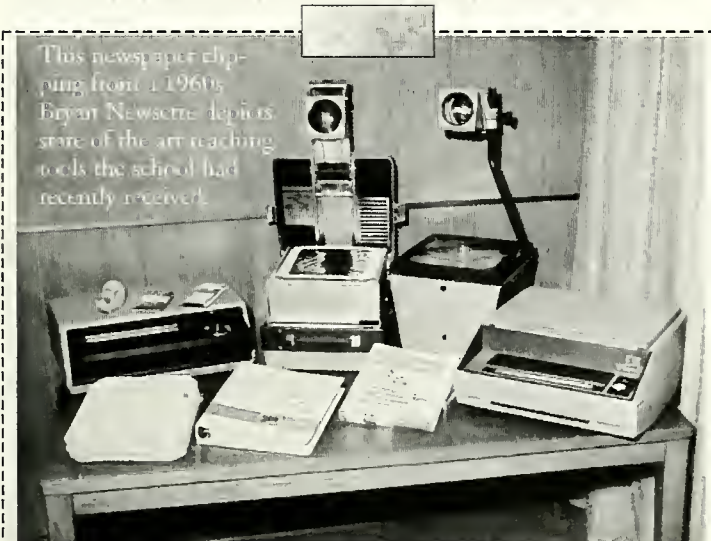

Education Department Receives Grant of Teaching Tools

The education department at Bryan has received a \$2,000 grant of teaching tools and reference materials given by the Minnesota Mining and Manufacturing Company to each of approximately 700 accredited teacher training institutions.

The grant includes three machines—a transparency maker and copier, a classroom overhead projector, and a portable overhead projector. In addition, there is a lecture series and workshop guide on visual aids, an accessories kit for preparing and using transparencies, a set of reference books on visual aids, and some 200 packets of transparency originals on various subjects for teaching aids.

a business meeting in the afternoon and the annual homecoming banquet in the evening. Ray Childress '55 of Pikeville, Ky., is president of the Alumni Association, and Miss Virginia Seguire '54, of Dayton, is chairman of the homecoming committee.

An additional gift of a photo copy machine for use in making reproductions from books provided by the class of 1965 will complement the larger grant.

In making the recent \$1.5 million Assistance Grant to Education Programs, the Minnesota Mining and Manufacturing Company is seeking to assist the teacher training institutions in making improvements in the entire education system. Through better trained teachers it is hoped to produce better students, who through their training and motivation will help move America forward in the future.

The new teaching tools will be available in the visual aids laboratory of the education department. A large majority of Bryan students will benefit by the instruction in the use of the equipment, since approximately three-fourths of Bryan's current graduates are being certified to teach at elementary or secondary levels.

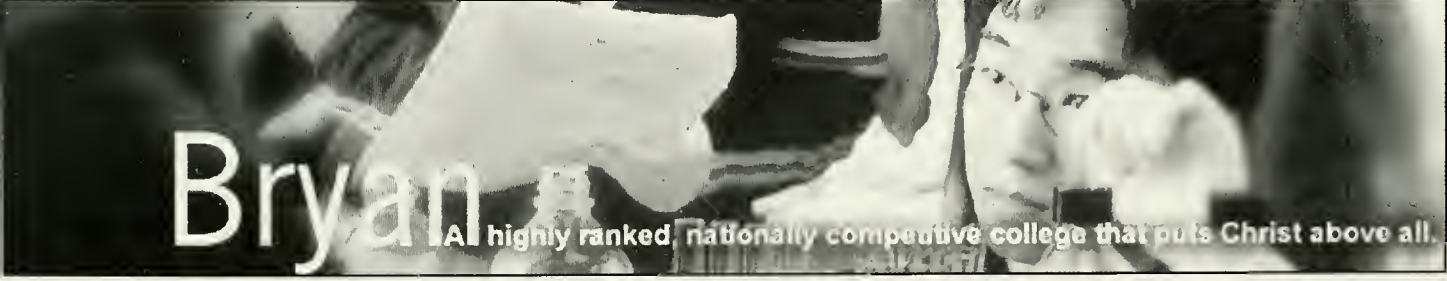

Development defined. What is a development program? Basically a development program is an overall, total, unified program of institutional planning with both immediate and long range goals designed to bring about the greatest degree of fulfillment possible of the objectives and ideals of the institution. Development concerns both expansion and improvement. It deals with such academic matters as curriculum, faculty, quality of instruction; it is preeminently concerned with services to students at many levels; it includes facilities and equipment; and basic to all these, it is concerned with financial resources, which control matters such as improvement of faculty salaries, increased endowment, and educational expenditures such as library improvement.

Involvement. The key to the success of any program is the involvement of people. For Bryan this means the trustees, who are the policy makers; the faculty and staff, who operate the institution; the alumni, who are its products; the students, who stand most to benefit from development programs; and all friends, old and new, far and near, who can be enlisted, without whose support the program cannot succeed. Development is not something to be carried on by just a few people (though it must have its planners and leaders) nor is it something which takes place just in an office. It is the marshalling in a systematic, intelligent,

Bryan students use MLK Day to serve community

On Mon., Jan. 17, Martin Luther King Jr. Day, groups of Bryan College students invaded Dayton and surrounding communities to help and serve in any way they could. This was the first time Bryan has officially observed the holiday.

The group of hundreds of students who gathered to work that cold Monday morning was just one special aspect of this service project.

A tremendous amount of planning went into making this day of service possible, according to Dr. Travis Ricketts, director of Practical Christian Involvement. It began under the initiative of Dr. Stephen Livesay, president of the college, and a committee was put together to get it off the ground. Senior Paul Miller and junior Kate Sealy, the leaders of PCI group Students in Service, made most of the phone contacts that turned into service opportunities.

Deciding who to contact was hard, according to Ricketts, as this kind of project was new for the college. Faculty and staff came up with a list of people they knew could use help. They also looked at the information bulletins at local churches to get some more ideas. All the hard work paid off.

"I'm really stunned by how well it worked," Ricketts said. "It was by the grace of God."

Students participated in a wide variety of projects. These included cleaning up brush at several camps, organizing bookshelves at the Dayton library, doing some major work on buildings, and washing windows while standing out in the freezing cold. Some smaller

groups went to serve individuals who needed help with jobs they couldn't do themselves.

"There are many people in every community who need a touch from us as Christians," said Livesay. "We, in a tangible way, demonstrated our faith."

Students were impacted by the day of service also. "This is the first time a lot of them have been in a

large service project," says senior Phillip Schroeder, president of PCI at Bryan.

Schroeder believes this is a great way to show students the needs around them, and show them that all it takes to serve is someone willing to help.

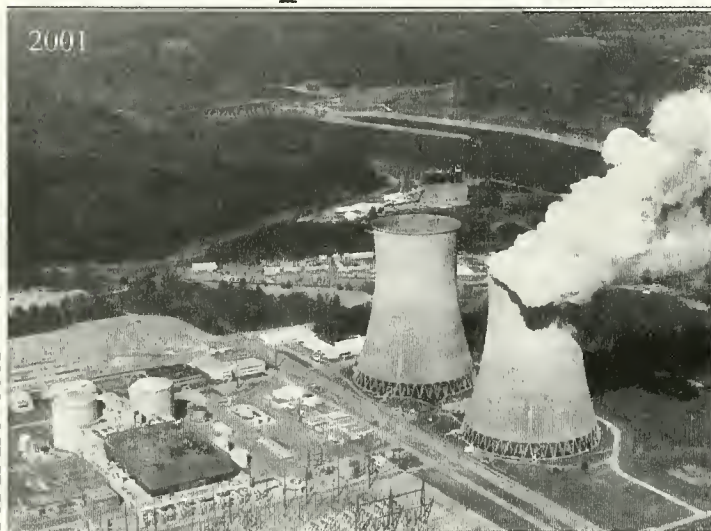

Nuclear plants increase security

Nearby nuclear plants cause concerns about possible terrorism

In a recent chapel Bryan College Vice President of Student Life Dr. Peter Held announced that Bryan College students need to have an evacuation plan that would keep them away from the college for a maximum of five days in the case of terrorist attack. The thought of terrorism in the local area has caused some students and residents to view nearby nuclear power plants, including Watts Bar Nuclear Plant and Sequoyah Nuclear Plant, with concern.

Watts Bar Nuclear Plant, owned and operated by the Tennessee Valley Authority and located just outside of neighboring Spring City, is about 15 miles northeast of Dayton. Watts Bar boasts one active nuclear pressurized water reactor that produced 9.63 billion KWh in 2001.

The Sequoyah Nuclear Plant, according to one website, "is a two unit, light pressurized water (LPRW) reactor plant, with each unit capable of almost 1150 Megawatts," and is located about 22 miles southeast of Dayton, in Soddy-Daisy,

Bill Roller Testifies of Blessings in Korea

He stood in front of the chapel audience and quietly declared that words could not express his deep feeling of gratitude to the Lord for His faithfulness to him in the past two and a half years. With some degree of nervousness he added that he would rather strap on his radio and carbine and creep out on a dangerous patrol than face those present. Yet, in the next few minutes, speaking with calm forcefulness, Bill R. Per, recently returned from war-torn Korea, challenged the hearts of those listening with a simple testimony of what the Lord could do through a dedicated life in Uncle Sam's Army.

"We can ask the Lord what, when, where, and how, but we must never ask Him why," Bill said as his mind went back in retrospect to that day in 1950, while he was a student at Bryan, when his number had come up before the induction board, and within a few weeks he was training at Camp Atterbury, Indiana. At that time it was difficult for him to understand the "why" of it all, but in spite of the questions which found lodging in his mind he recognized that God's ways are "past finding out"; they are for us to accept without reservation.

May 9, he arrived in Japan and in five short days he was on the front lines just above the parallel. One day above the line was relieved. On the next day he did Bill realize that the Lord was not to be taken for granted. With a few weeks of Bible classes, he had a vision of the class, which grew rapidly in the succeeding weeks. Several were saved, and the Lord's presence was felt.

It came time for rotation, and Bill began preparation along with the others for the trip back home to his friends and loved ones, but the Lord began to speak in His own mysterious way, and before long Bill knew that the Lord wanted him to stop. After a fierce inward struggle, Bill found his desire before the personnel office and was soon signed up for five more months on the bleak, battle-scarred hills of Korea. He continued the classes in an old quonset hut, and

before long the Lord awarded his faithfulness with five more souls. Shortly after this, they were sent to the front lines, where the Lord answered prayer in spades. Bill's company, and two more fellows were saved—one on an out-post. Then operations were shifted to infamous "Triangle Hill." It became increasingly hard to keep the meetings going, and fewer and fewer came out. A "nothing-is-going-to-happen" attitude seemed to prevail.

One day the enemy chose Bill's outfit for its first attack on the hill. No meetings could be held now in the midst of the artillery barrage. This was the day that Bill was wounded. He was able to get to the rear only 30 percent of his company of 600 men. Back there on "Triangle Hill" boys who didn't know his Lord, and this thought weighed heavily on Bill's heart as he was sent back to Japan to the convalescent hospital.

In the next few weeks, he prayed much and read much in God's Word. One day, finding an empty room, he dropped to his knees and told the Lord that he would go back to those "bankers"—back to his buddies that needed the Lord so desperately.

After his wounds had healed, he went to Camp Drake, but the authorities informed him that he was not allowed to go back. Then

Will Churches Behind the Iron Curtain Survive?

Mrs. Tolliver and I have just arrived under the Chinese sky. We saw the amazing growth of the iron curtain and found behind the iron curtain

In 1948, when we returned to China from furlough, we were convinced that the best contribution that a foreign missionary can make to a native church is in teaching the Word of God. Because of that conviction, I taught in Chinese Bible schools for two and a half years—up until Communist pressure forced me to stop 14 months ago. Now that we have both observed in others and experienced in ourselves the Communist attack on the Christian faith, we are more convinced than ever that it is only a Bible-taught, Spirit-filled, self-supporting church that will endure under Communism. Some Chinese churches, hobbled on foreign money instead of built up on meat of the Word, have either disbanded or gotten the easier course) have succumbed to the lacerating temptation to degrade the

pulpit into an instrument of Communist propaganda. Those Christians who have remained faithful and have sought their new and perplexing problems have exerted a quiet but ever-widening spiritual trumpet-call that will be drowned out by neither the clang of prison gates nor the roar of the executioner's rifle. This conviction concerning the pre-eminence of teaching the Word to the national Christians was shared, I believe, by the majority of the 300 missionaries of the China Inland Mission and like-minded societies whom we were able to help in Chungking during the great evacuation of 1951.

During these crucial days on world mission fields—and especially in the Communist-threatened Far East—missions are asking for young people equipped to help the national churches by teaching—not only teaching the doctrines of the Bible, but, as our Lord emphasized, "Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I commanded you." Yes, that is the teaching that presses His followers to obedience, to action in daily living, and that kind of help to the national churches can only be given by men and women equipped in both mind and heart and who teach by life as well as by lip.

make it more severe when it does arrive.

As in the years preceding 1929, some of us are anticipating the reaction which will eventually come from present-day inflation. I look for several years of minor ups and downs, such as we have been having, but accompanied by a general upward trend. This will deceive many. With such a large gold supply, with the tremendous government debt, and with our banks in such a strong position, we can and probably will have further inflation. Technological improvements tend to hold prices down, but the fiscal policy of our government in reaction to Russia seems to be the deciding factor economically in our day.

World events make exceedingly practical the old motto: "Work as though Christ were not coming for a thousand years; live as though He were coming today." As Christians we must not become surfeited with the cares of this life. We should invest in things which cannot be taken from us. There is no better investment than real Christian education, both for our students and for our contributing friends, because a dollar so invested is compounded for time and eternity through the lives thus reached directly and indirectly.

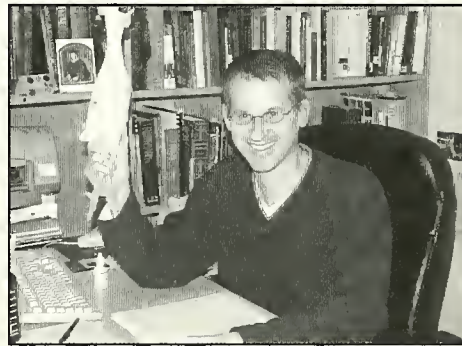
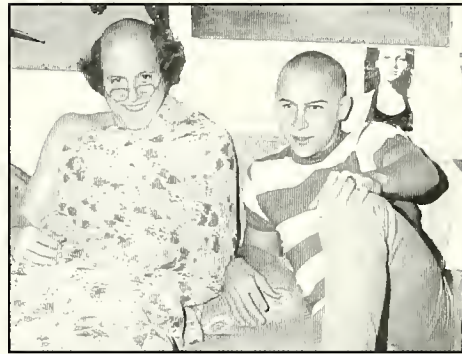
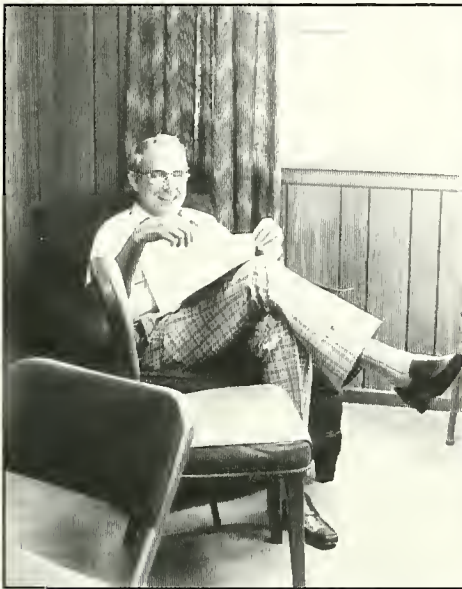
REMEMBER THE TIME WHEN . . .

"One of the unwritten rules of being in a place of authority at an academic institution is that one must endure practical jokes. As dean, Ryther endured his share. There was the time when President Rudd woke him up at 1:00 a.m. to ask for help. Some students had

So there we were, at one o'clock in the morning, grabbing for ducks.'"

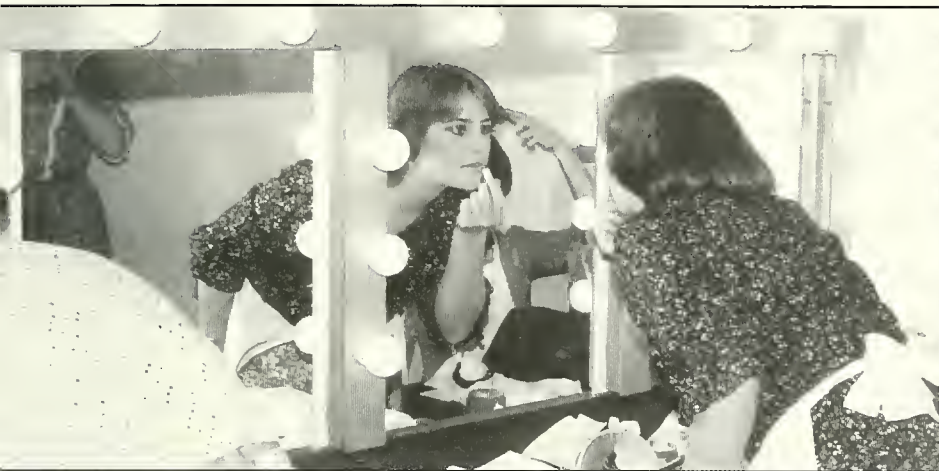

CSA Reorganized, New Council Selected; Students Reach 2500 School Children Weekly

To increase its efficiency and to augment its effectiveness, the George E. Gullie Christian Service Association was reorganized during the first weeks of the fall quarter. It has been the purpose of the organization throughout the years to provide opportunity for students and staff members to present the Gospel by teaching, preaching, singing, and personal work in Dayton and in the neighboring mountain and valley communities.

The new CSA constitution stipulates that all students engaging in any type of Christian service activity must be members of the Christian Service Association and that all Christian service is to be reported on forms provided by the co-ordinator.

INVITE 18,000 FRIENDS TO GIFTS-FOR-THE-KING

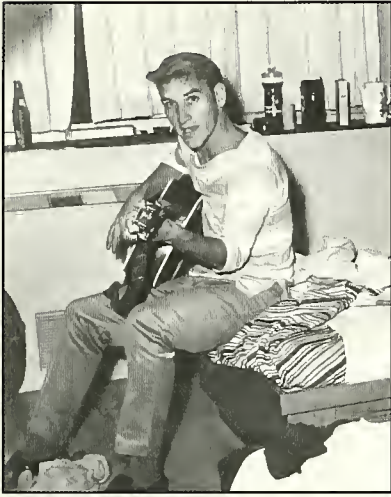

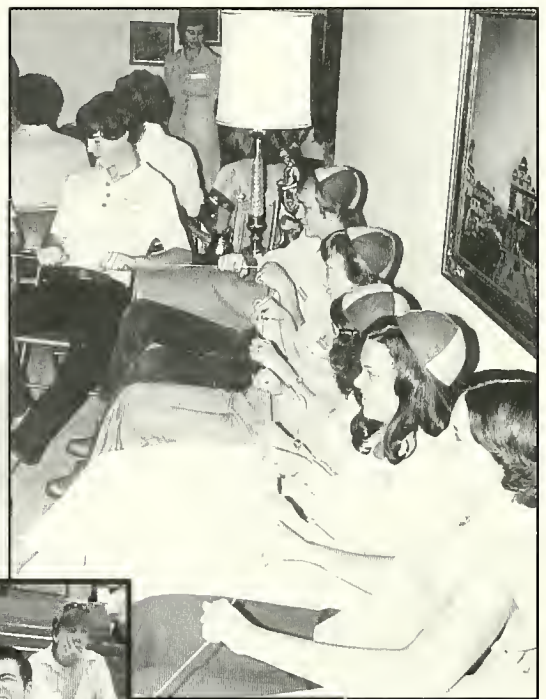

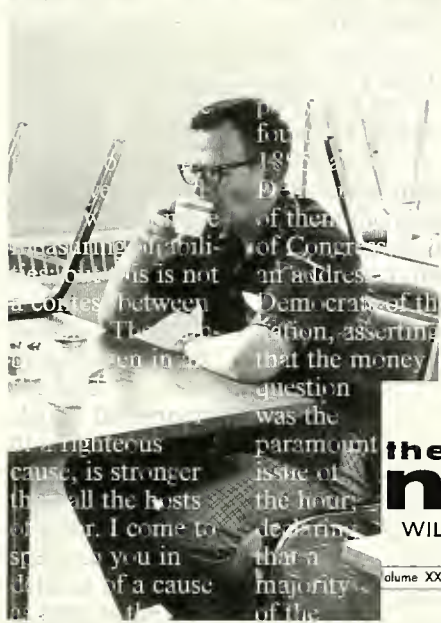

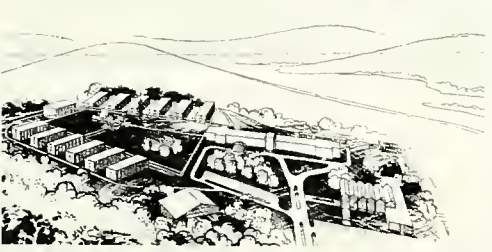

Gift of \$35,000 Sparks Dormitory Fund Drive

The \$35,000 grant received recently from an anonymous donor has been allocated for use in constructing a men's dormitory. This action was taken by the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees at their meeting on December 5. The Executive Committee which carries on the work of the Trustees between sessions of the full Board also decided to inaugurate a drive for funds in 1962 to raise the additional money which would be needed to finance a dormitory. It is estimated that a total of \$250,000 to \$300,000 will be required. The architects' firm of Wilson and McCulloch of Charlotte, North Carolina, are preparing plans for the building. These are expected to be available in a few weeks. Present plans are to build a dormitory to house at least one hundred men.

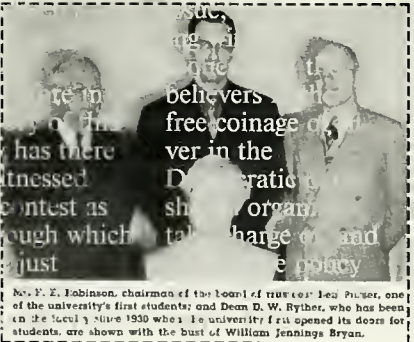
This development would be carried out according to the master campus development plan which was prepared by the architect two years ago and which appears in this issue.

In commenting on the gift and the plans for a men's dormitory, Dr. Mercer said, "One aspect of Bryan's ability to increase its enrollment is distinctly related to new student housing. At present our men are housed in two small frame dormitory units and three apartments. Besides the need for better standard quality housing, there is also the need for additional space to house additional men. I think the construction of a standard dormitory will do a great deal for the entire College program."

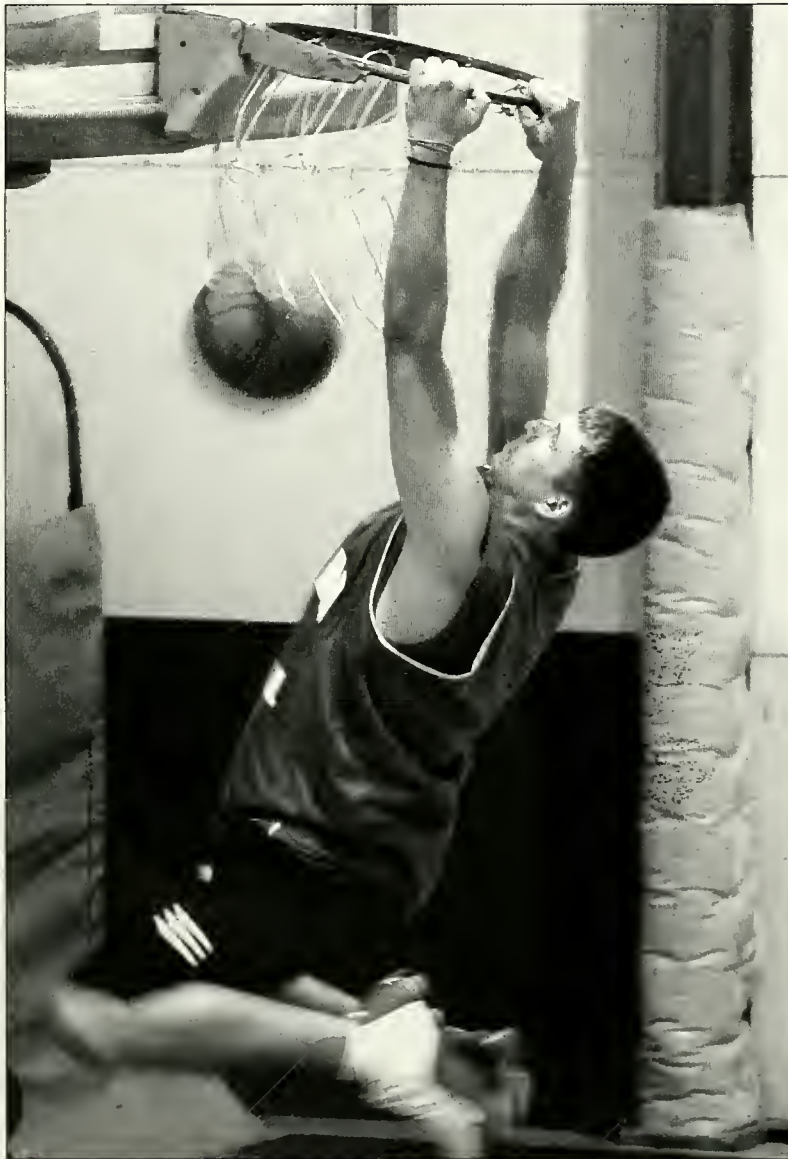

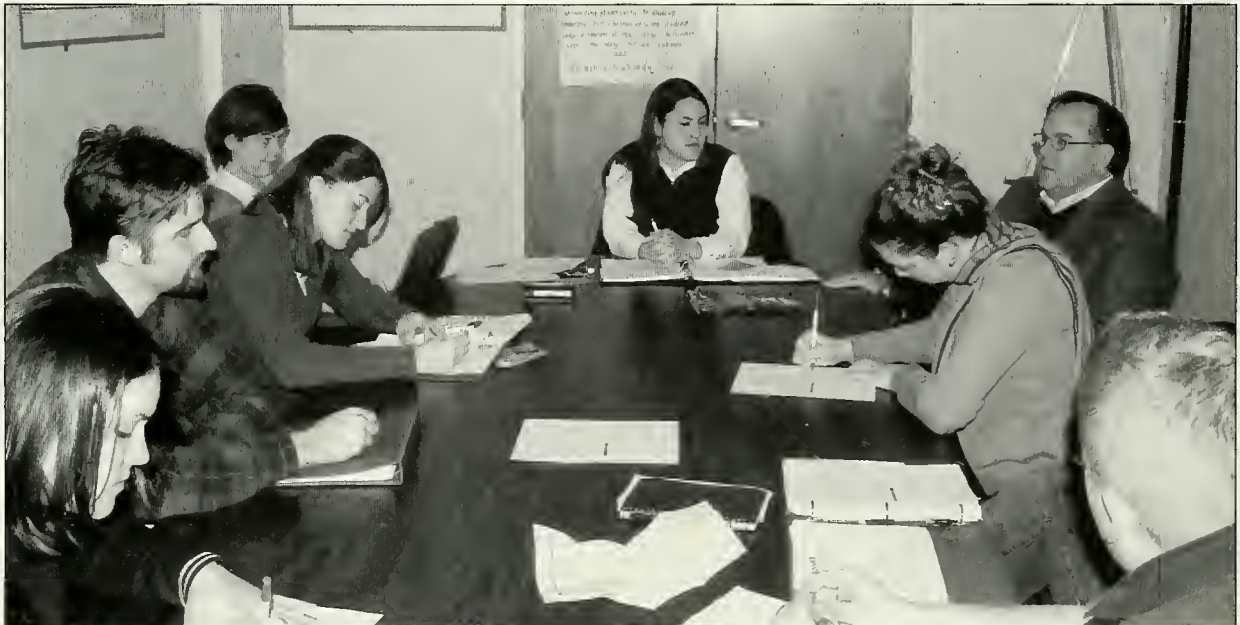

With radio and record players omnipresent, a Christian college must be concerned with the sort of music which is played on these instruments. Please note the following points concerning which your understanding and cooperation is expected.

We start with the basic premise that jazz, rock-and-roll, boogie-woogie, and related sorts of music are a liability rather than an asset in the spiritual life of a Christian person. Therefore, a Christian college has a responsibility to guide it's students away from these forms of music and toward a good quality, uplifting form of musical expression.

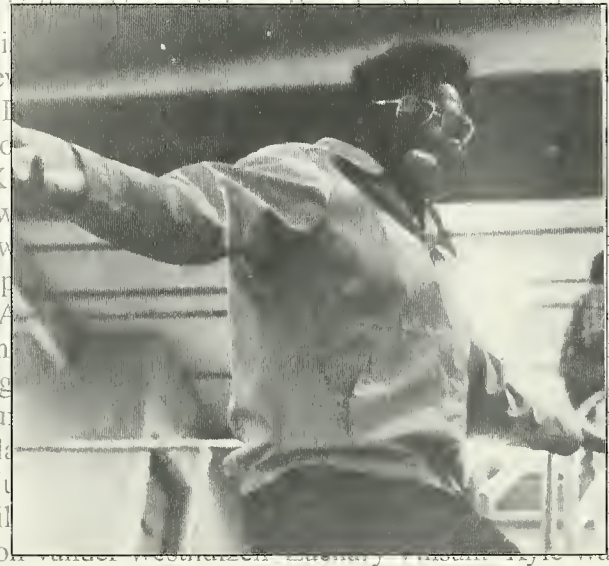
We recognize that many pieces of music cannot be easily categorized. Some music (which we usually call "classical") is almost without exception acceptable to people of spiritual discernment and good taste. Some is clearly unacceptable. There is a substantial area in between where people will always differ.

To meet this need, a joint student-faculty committee functions to screen student records for playing in public areas of the campus. This committee consists of a representative of the music faculty and two student members chosen by the Community Council.

Any student who has records which he would like to play in a public place may have these records cleared by giving them to any member of the committee. The committee will listen to them and give him an early decision. A list of approved records will be made available at a place to be specified by the committee.

A final area related to his matter is the use of musical instruments in the practice rooms, studios, and chapel. These are provided primarily for official practice and service purposes. You are not to use the facilities for recreation or other casual purposes, except by permission from a member of the music faculty. In such cases, the type of music played is subject to regulation, and may not include jazz, rock-and-roll, boogie-woogie, and such like

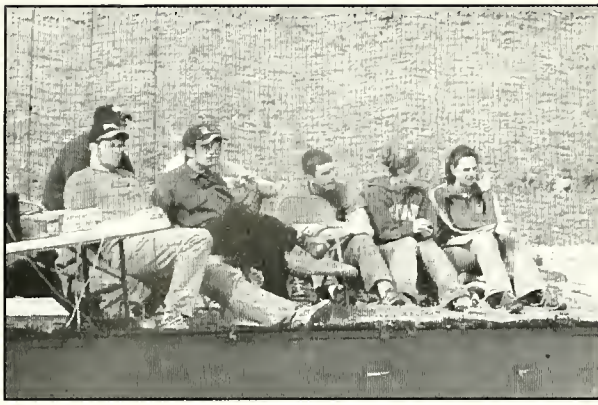

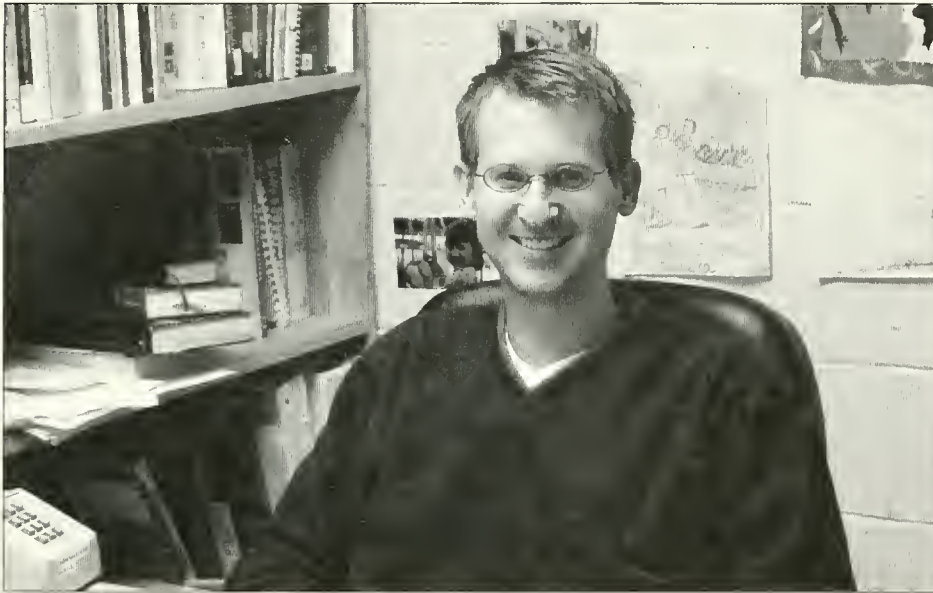
SENIOR SNEAK:

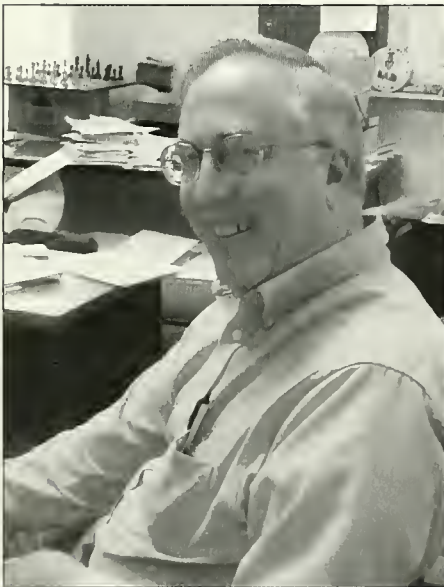
